How did all this happen?

Vatican II, which was a pastoral, ecumenical council, opened in Rome by Pope John XXIII. It lasted from 1963-1965. In the aftermath of this Council, changes were being made in the Church which were not keeping to the traditions of the Catholic Church, the one true church, founded by Our Lord Jesus Christ, which will last until the end of time.






A picture of a large addition to the north, which was completed in 1992.

In the fall of 2019, Our Lady of Good Success Academy opened its doors.





Father Bolduc passed away on September 10, 2012, after being our priest for about 29 years. Since then St. Michael's Church has been a mission chapel of the Society of St. Pius X. Dedicated Society priests fly or drive to St. Michael's every weekend for a Saturday Mass and two Sunday Masses. Besides giving us the Sacraments, they are here on Holy Days, First Friday and First Saturday Masses, for baptisms, weddings, and funerals.

Early history of St. Michael's Chapel

We all realized what Vatican II was going to do to the Catholic Church. First, they took out St. John's gospel and then came all the English sing-a-long Masses. Then in 1968, the Cathedral held a meeting for the parishioners regarding the soon to be remodeled church. I attended this meeting with my dad, Lawrence Selissen. They showed us the architect's rendering and the fact that they were going to bulldoze the privileged main altar and put up the table altar.

They wouldn't even listen to the parishioners and, in fact, stated the plans were made and the contractors were hired. This was a

railroaded job on us and they were going to bring all the Diocese in line by first "remodeling" the Cathedral. I was told I would have to get married at the side altar. Ken and I got married at St. Boniface and had a partial Latin Mass.

The summer of 1968, my dad spent a lot of time on the phone and on our front porch with Fr. Bujarski, Horton Roe, both classmates of my dad, and other priests trying to get a traditional movement started. Dad knew lots of people and worked with Pete Peot, Alma Beemster's brother, and members of the John Birch Society. The Peots also grew up at the Cathedral church. Henry and Alma Beemster, Beemster Electric, had many contacts and Henry's brother was a White Father, from whom he got a lot of old vestments and linens, which Alma had her seamstress fix and remake when we started the chapel. John White worked for Beemster Electric and lived in the house directly below what is now the priory. So, John told Henry about this property and Henry and Alma purchased both houses and a garage workshop on the property. In the summer and fall of 1969, work was started to make a chapel of the garage.

That summer we all drove to Peshtigo to attend Latin Mass at Fr. Bujarski's church. He was due to retire soon and didn't want to become our pastor, thinking he wouldn't get his retirement from

the diocese if he did this. He did say Mass for us in the basement of this priory. Present were Henry and Alma Beemster, Lawrence and Laverne and Paul and Delores Selissen, Ken and Mary Jo Gerrits, John White, and occasionally David and Kris Selissen and little girl at all. I really don't remember much until about second Ed and Vi Duquaine.

Ken did the framing for the chapel and Beemster Electric employees did the electrical work and helped with the paneling. Henry and Alma gathered statues and the crucifix, stations, candlesticks, etc. so we could open our chapel. I don't remember the date we first used the chapel-sometime in the very late 1969, as I was pregnant with Amy.

We did have a choir. Horton Roe on his portable organ with Paul and Lawrence Selissen and Alma Beemster and myself. Amy was born February 5, 1970, and even though we could not get her baptized here, Mrs. Beemster said she would always consider Amy as the first baby of our church.

The Beemsters found Father Beran, and we had eight priests including Father Bujarski from 1970-1973, then Father Altenbach came and stayed until 1980. My dad knew Father Altenbach because my dad and Horton Roe sang with Horton Roe's choir at St. Mary's and they would occasionally go to Milwaukee to sing there. I am not sure, but I believe it was Father Altenbach who first started baptizing babies here as our Laura was baptized here.

Memories from Amy (Gerrits) Soquet

Unfortunately, I don't have very many memories from being a grade, and those are only a few things.

For instance, I remember telling my teacher I was confirmed. but I do not remember Confirmation.

I do remember having Mrs. Beemster for catechism one year in the room off of the dining room in the priest's house. I also

remember being in Aunt Jeanie's class in the old house. It was before it was "remodeled" at all. We sat on the couch in the living room overlooking the ravine on the side of the property.

lalso remember having Sunday Mass in the afternoons for a while. During that time, we would go to either Grandma Sellssen's house or Aunt Jeanie and Uncle Ron's house to have choir practice with Aunt Betty (Sister Rita) (the children's choir) before going to Mass.

also remember high school catechism class in the basement of the priest's house with Mrs. Merriman. We only had about six of us, if I remember correctly. I guess one thing that I do remember is that we were very creative with classroom space.

Memories from Cindy (Mooren) Vander Heiden

I don't remember attending any church before St. Michael's. My earliest memories are all at our beloved parish. It was my "normal," so I didn't realize at the time how blessed we were to have such a rare treasure.

However, I remember a conversation I had with my dad when I was an adult, and he told me that he was attending the Novus Ordo Mass while they were implementing the changes, and it never felt right to him. The first time he attended St. Michael's, he said it felt like home. So, I don't know the exact reasons as to why they came to St. Michael's, or how they heard about it, but I know why they never left.

Memories from Kathy (Selissen) Paque and David Selissen

In 1968, a small group of men in the Green Bay and De Pere area of Wisconsin were deeply concerned about all these changes since the Second Vatican Council. They met with Bishop Wycislo expressing their concerns. There was a teenage mass going on at St. Agnes Church. Many other changes were happening in churches all over the diocese. Also, around this time there were five priests teaching at Premontre High School who denied the virginity of the Blessed Mother and the divinity of Our Lord. And the Bishop did nothing.

When these men met with Bishop Wycislo, he refused to listen to them and he went ahead with implementing the "new ideas." David remembers the real reason these men went to see the Bishop was because the new Mass changed the words of the Consecration which made the Mass invalid. The Bishop did allow

one church in the diocese to say a Latin Mass, but that was soon discontinued.

Mr. Henry Beemster along with Mr. Ed Duquaine, Mr. Lawrence Selissen and Mr. Peter Peot were trying to get a traditional movement started. Mr. Beemster's main reason for working so hard at this project was that the Roman Latin Rite Mass for all times would always be available for any one who wanted to come.

Mr. Beemster was a successful businessman and was very generous in helping our priests and nuns. One of Mr. Beemster's employees, Mr. John White, lived in the house directly below what is now the rectory. His parents owned the land on which our St. Michael's Church stands. This land was for sale at this time and Mr. Beemster purchased it. On this property were two houses and a garage workshop.

The diocese was never in favor of St. Michael's, but because it was operating on private property, they had no authority to close it down. And now after 50 years we still have a thriving parish!

Memories from Bev (Belleau) School

fondly remember my dad as (in my eyes) the smartest man L ever knew. He was a voracious reader and, through his decades of reading good religious and political publications (shelves of the American Opinion magazines) and later the John Birch Society's New American magazine, he was a true-blue conservative.

Bill's dearest friend was Peter Peot (Alma Beemster's brother), who was our church usher for many years. Every Sunday was time

for the two of these great minds to get together to discuss religion/politics and what in the world is happening to our Catholic Religion and church, over games of cribbage and a few old fashions.

I loved to hear them discuss things. Very early they knew things were amiss in the church and, by 1970, my dad told us kids he couldn't in good conscience allow us to attend our local parish church anymore.

I genuinely felt that my dad's and Pete's discussions led to Pete sharing concerns with Alma and her husband, Henry.

Henry Beemster in his great modest, humble way, felt that that must be why God had allowed him to make so much money through Beemster Electric and it was his great forethought and generosity that gave us a place to worship, though he naively thought this extreme move of having a chapel constructed for only the "true Mass" would only be needed for a few short years!

I recall a few Masses maybe in the priest's residence basement, kneeling on pads on the floor. I remember all those years in the first church on folding chairs and the ugly yellow fly catching tape hanging from the ceiling. But what a beautiful altar and statues!

I can still hear Father Altenbach's booming voice with the same lecture week after week, as he tried to reach that first-time listener of the Mass carried on the radio.

But I thank God for all the blessings he has bestowed on St. Michael's and especially that I was confirmed by Archbishop Lefebvre, himself, in 1978.

Memories from Linda (De Jardin) Seidl

The changes in the church after Vatican II were gradual and slow so the people wouldn't notice. First the music, then the table, priest facing the people, removal of communion railing, allowing Saturday Mass to fulfill Sunday obligation, but the final straw was allowing Communion in the hand.

The older generation of people were upset at first. But if the priest said it was ok and they liked the priest, it was alright with them. The middle-aged people just said they were not going to travel 30-40 miles when we have a perfectly good Catholic Church two miles away. The younger ones soon forgot the traditional way.

There was a group of five families who came from the Luxemburg, Wisconsin area who purchased a "Blue Bus" and Mr. Andrew Bouche drove the bus to St. Michael's every Sunday. Of those five families, some have passed away and there are only two people who still come faithfully to St. Michael's. How sad is that?

The families in this area found out about St. Michael's from Andrew Bouche. He started working for Mr. Henry Beemster. Andrew was my mother's brother-in-law and he told her about it. Within a few weeks she went by herself to check out St. Michael's. She said when she heard the traditional music when Mass started, she cried. She knew she was now "Home." She then spread the word but only a few would listen, and I thank her everyday for her persistence. She was a great mother and had a true love for our Blessed Mother!

Neighbors and family members used to argue with my mom saying there is no difference. But their conscience must have bothered them somewhat because they were always the ones to bring up the subject of the Church.

My mom even had the local priest come and argue with her. She church built under Fr. Bolduc's tutelage. This is our HOME, our never backed down. She knew her faith – MY HERO!!

My mother also made hundreds of rosaries!

Memories from James & Karen Wochos

Both Jamie and I were raised attending the **Tridentine Rite** Mass; myself a singer at Mass, weddings, etc., Jamie a long-time Altar Server under a very reverent Norbertine priest. In the aftermath of Vatican II, the stirrings of my soul

began, upset over raucous music, irreverence for the Eucharist, uneasiness about the liturgy. Summer 1973, a dear friend asked me to sing for her daughter's wedding, introducing me to St. Michael's for the first time, followed by lending me the book "The Great Sacrilege," which I read cover to cover. Then, I was asked to sing for the funeral of a friend's 17-year-old son, bringing me back to St. Michael's and the beautiful sublime Requiem Tridentine Rite Mass. Lasked Jamie to accompany me to Mass there the following Sunday. I will NEVER forget his look, and his words after the Mass ended – with tears in his eyes, he exclaimed emphatically, NOW I AM HOME!! He helped Fr. Altenbach in the printing of his "New vs Old Mass" brochures and remarkable book. I helped by singing in the choir, two of our five children onfirmed at St. Michael's by saintly Archbishop Lefebvre HIIMSELF in 1978, one in 1982, then seeing our beautiful new hurch - the Tridentine Mass the most beautiful thing this side of heaven! So grateful to the very holy, dedicated priests who now faithfully provide their services to us.

By the grace of God, Charles and Katherine Andresen recognized the errors in the church in the 1960s. With the Elmer Zarling family, they began to search for the true Mass and sacraments. Joined by the Delbert Stenson family and the rest of the Robert Zarling, Sr. family they banded together in prayer.

At this time, Leo Zarling was building a new house for himself and his parents. A decision was made to build a chapel in the basement of the new house with hopes of finding a traditional priest to say Mass and provide sacraments. It was at this time the group learned of St. Michael's.

Someone from the group would drive to St. Michael's every Sunday to pick up the priest and bring him to Oshkosh for Mass. After Mass another member of the group would drive the priest back to St. Michael's. This practice continued until Father Altenbach became the priest at St. Michael's. Father Altenbach would travel from Milwaukee to St. Michael's each week and on his way back to Milwaukee, would stop in Oshkosh.

The Oshkosh group outgrew the basement chapel and, in 1974, most of the group chose to drive to St. Michael's.

Some of the hanges that I remember and was often talked about by my parints were the altar change, the priest facing the people, the Mass being said in English, the introduction of band instruments such hs gultars playing during Mass, the parish priest (Father Vanderhelden) began to refer to himself as Padre.

People would ask our parents: Are you going to that renegade hurch? How come you don't come here anymore? Why would you drive one hour to church when you have a Catholic Church two blocks from your home?

There were a number of families from our Oshkosh area that believe in tradition as my parents did. The Don Holland famly, Jacqueline Wagner, the Charles Andreson family, the John arling family, Leo Zarling, James and Maggie Jungwirth, the Watson family, Valarie Sitter, the Luedtke family, Ed and Rose Penzenstadler, Judy Weisheipl, and Mr. and Mrs. Binner.

From 1971 to 1973, Father Altenbach would drive from De Pere to Oshkosh and say Mass in the afternoon at our St. Pius X Chap Memories of Huey and Karla Sigl el in the farm house basement of Leo Zarling. In 1973, Father Altenbach discontinued saying Mass in Oshkosh and some of th families followed our parents to St. Michael's.

John Zarling was the person in Oshkosh to learn about Father Altenbach and the Traditional Mass being offered at St. Michael The Zarling family started St. Pius X Chapel with Father Altenbach's approval in 1971, but two years later in 1973 it closed. Then without hesitation some of the faithful from St. Pius X decided to attend St. Michael's in De Pere.

Our family didn't socialize too much but the people that we did see remained good friends. To this day, a number of my grade school friends from St. Mary's stay in touch with me and we continue to be good friends. I feel very blessed by God to have bee provided with parents that recognized the errors of Vatican II and were strong in their beliefs in the face of a changing Catholi Michael's. Huey always fought for the true faith. Church.

Memories from a family who wants to remain anonymous

I want to write to defend my parents, the Catholic church before Vatican Council II, and the Latin Tridentine Mass before 1962.

The changes in the Catholic church after Vatican II to the Novus Ordo (New Mass) were deceitful. As the Novus Ordo became more obvious in our parish(es), it was clear that someone or something was trying to destroy our traditional beliefs and the true Catholic Church.

The changes occurred in my parish around 1967-1968. We wer told the church needed to change with the times. I was about or 10 years old then. Physical changes took place in our church over the course of about a year or two. Our old beautiful altar was torn out. As was the Communion rail. The Tabernacle was moved. The crucifix was replaced with "The Risen Christ." And the list goes on.


Our parents fought the changes in the Church and school, but didn't have more than a couple persons on their side. SSPX priests who have been assigned as pastor here 2012-2020




