



ANCIENT AND RARE BOOKS, dating back to the 15th century were placed upon display at the Gale Memorial Library, Laconia, Monday by Hector Bolduc of Gilford. They are from his collection of several thousand volumes, most of them gathered during his European period of Army service. Bolduc is holding the first illustrated edition of John Milton's "Paradise Lost," published in 1680; while Miss Ruth Johnson of the library

staff is examining "The Little Office of Our Lady," an illuminated manuscript painted by a French monk in 1480; while standing at left is a 1570 volume, on the life of the "Blessed Mother." Bolduc is a student at Catholic University, Washington, where he has completed two years of study. He is one of 13 children of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bolduc of Gilford.
