## Former Gilford Man Featured in Globe Article

The Rev. Hector Bolduc is the subject in today's Boston Globe of a feature article, "Catholic Underground in U.S. — How They Hear Latin Mass," by Bill Curry of the Los Angeles Times.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bolduc of Gilford, Father Bolduc is superior of the Southwest District of the Society of St. Pius X, operating out of St. Mary's Church in St. Mary's, Kans. As such, he travels thousands of miles yearly, mostly by air, ministering to those preferring the traditional Tridentine Masses. The numbers of this "small but growing and dedicated flock" of conservative Catholics are now estimated at some 100,000 strong, who are "committed to defining their church's hierarchy and the liberalization set in motion by the 1962-65 Vatican Council. In

private homes, hotels, banks, shopping centers, meeting halls and even in chapels, these Catholics meet whenever and wherever they can, ministered to by a handful of circuit-riding traditionalist priests like Bolduc.

The article continues: "Although Tridentine Masses may be said in some areas for small groups with the special permission of the bishop, Fr. Bolduc does not have such ecclesiastical authorization for his Masses."

"They bring to their far-flung parishes what traditionalist Catholics see as the symbol of the 'true church': the centuries-old Tridentine Latin Mass. It is a Mass barred in American Roman Catholic dioceses as a result of Vatican II. Replacing it, in the United States, is the new English Mass, with some textual changes. The Council also gave local bishops the power to experiment with services.
